Narrow-gauge trains ran along this rail grade twice a day, one in each direction, from 1887-1941, except on Sundays. The "Chili Line" connected Santa Fe to Antonito, Colo., 122 miles to the north, and to the D&RG RR's vast network of rail lines throughout southwestern Colorado and Utah.
